The Lutheran Hour Float

The 135th Tournament of Roses Parade, held on Jan. 1, 2024, in Pasadena, California, was themed "Celebrating a World of Music." The iconic annual parade again included a majestic floral float sponsored by The Lutheran Hour.



The 2024 LHM float, "Make a Joyful Noise unto the Lord," marked the 73rd time LHM has participated in the parade. This year's design featured three heralding trumpets proceeding from a hymn book. Hanging from the trumpets were banners featuring the great mantra of the Lutheran Reformation, which is God's plan of salvation: Grace Alone, Faith Alone, Christ Alone.

As a self-funded project of the Southern California District of the International Lutheran Laymen's League, the LHM float is the only Christian float in the annual parade. The float carries on a mission to provide a Gospel witness to viewers everywhere.

If you watched the parade, you probably did not miss the BSA and GSA Scouts carrying the banners that preceded some of the floats. The Scouts BSA members were all Eagle Scouts. The banners identified the award-winning floats.

This conference is designed so you are constantly networking with subject matter experts on faith topics, general BSA program topics, and geographic based Scouting resources. In fact, you're going to switch classrooms throughout the week based on what topic you want to hear about most!

We hope you can join us at PTC the week of July 7th-13th!

Here's an overview of the Week:

- **Monday- Position Breakout Classes:** Choose two positions you want to learn more about. Example: learn about the resources available Unit Leaders in the morning and Religious Emblems Coordinators in the afternoon.
- **Tuesday- Faith Specific Classes:** Learn in-depth resources specific to an individual faith group in three (3) sessions during the week. There is a whole list to choose from. Some faiths will be repeating the same session three times, others may have a different topic in each of their sessions, and some faiths may only have one session offered.
- **Wednesday & Friday Morning- Free Choice Classes OR Service Projects OR Field Trips:** The choice is yours during these two half days. We have a wide variety of University of Scouting classes from which to choose. OR you can participate in a half day field trip or service project.
- **Wednesday Afternoon- Family Time:** You've got the afternoon off to explore PTC, the National BSA Museum, the Kit Carson living history museum at Rayado or the surrounding areas of beautiful Northern New Mexico.
- **Thursday Morning- All Faith Sessions:** We'll all be together for this half day answering the always important question, "I have a Scout in my unit that is ___ faith. What do I need to know to help them with Duty to God?"
- **Friday Afternoon- Speed Networking:** The topics are your choice throughout the week. We'll hold up signs with a topic name and you choose which one to go to in our 20-minute lightning networking sessions. PLUS Graduation, goal setting, and celebrating an awesome week.

❖ P.R.A.Y. (Jason) – Effective 1 Jan, there will be price increases for P.R.A.Y. books and awards. Jason also would like to increase the price of the Lutheran adult awards by \$5.00, due to increase in postal expenses. He would like to enhance the award nomination applications to clarify who files the paperwork. Nomination paperwork has to be submitted by someone other than the recipient and they need to identify who they are. The Board is supportive of these modifications. There was a discussion of who has the originals of the nomination forms. Wayne has Word .doc versions of these forms that came from Deb Hazlewood, in case we need them for modification. Tom will contact Jason to see how he wants to proceed.

❖ BSA (Wendy) – No report.

❖ Girls Scouts (Christin)- No report. From Wayne: Noorain Khan was announced as the new National President of Girl Scouts USA in a message dated 16 Sept.

❖ Minutes (Wayne) –Minutes of Executive Board meeting of 15 July and Annual Meeting of 15 July were distributed on 1 August. Minutes stand as submitted.

❖ Financials (Phil)

- Monthly report: We currently have \$3096.36 in checking and \$110,235.74 in investment accounts; no outstanding bills.
- QuickBooks has changed from desktop to online version, now costing \$85/month. Means of using corporate or non-profit purchasing mechanisms to lower cost were discussed. Phill will look into.

❖ Robert reports that he has already updated the 2024-2025 membership renewal letter. He also has updated a template for membership cards that can be sent out with membership renewals. Many members have commented that they have not received new ones for a while. Because the process of printing and cutting all of the membership cards was very time consuming in the past and they were sent separately after membership renewals, Robert had discontinued them. Now that the process has been streamlined, membership cards will be included with the renewals.

 - Suggestions for promoting the Facebook page to convert “followers” into members were discussed. Suggestions include asking other organizations to promote the page (synods & districts), using the NRRC Membership Committee, and running membership notices on the page itself (Note: this has been done each year at membership renewal).
- ❖ NRRC/National (Wayne/Ron A/Jim W)
- ❖ Sub-Committee Reports – DTG Breakfast: The Most Reverend Michael W Fisher, Bishop of the Diocese of Buffalo has been selected to speak at the Duty-to-God breakfast at the BSA annual meeting on May 8th. Bishop Fischer is an Eagle Scout and received the Ad Altari Dei award as a youth.
- ❖ Spirituality Award – It was reported in the NRRC meeting that draft requirements are being prepared for the K-2 level of the Spirituality Award. There has been no review in the Duty to God group yet. NLAS would like to see that it is consistent with the BSA Declaration of Religious Principle. Tom will speak with Bob Vogt on the purpose of the award. (Note from Duty to God sub-committee dated 1 June 2020: *This would focus on the “nones”. It opens the door for an organized exploration of spirituality/faith without the specific tie to an organized religion. There is international precedent in Canada with the “Spirituality Award.”* The idea was presented as similar to the faith exploration that may be selected as part of the Venturing Trust Award.)
- ❖ 2024 Interfaith Week (July 7 – 13, 2024) – This year’s “faith week” is a departure from the traditional format. There is some Lutheran content, but also content that may be of interest to many can be selected at registration, creating an opportunity to customize the individual experience. There are also group service opportunities, such as the opportunity to refurbish back country chapels.
- ❖ Newsletter (Marti)
 - Thanks! – Tom expressed thanks. The Fall 2023 newsletter was great!
 - Newsletter - Deadline is moved to end of December for the winter edition. It is important to get articles in time for publication. Expect the newsletter to be published quarterly, and submit articles appropriately.
- ❖ Awards/Recognition (Judi) – no report. Observation: Awards seem to be going strongly, based on reimbursement requests.
- ❖ Chaplaincy Committee (Pastor Rick)–no report.
 - Recruiting/training for Philmont
- ❖ Events
 - Best Practices in Ministry, Phoenix, Feb 22-24 (Tom – need local help); The NLAS presentation was not accepted for the conference (only 250 accepted from 500+ submissions!), but NLAS will be presenting a display on the topic of how chartering a scouting unit helps the congregation. A QR codes will be used as a take-away reference. Ryan offered to create codes for the display.
 - National Meeting, Orlando: May 5-9, NRRC meeting (5/7), DTG Breakfast (5/8)
- ❖ New business/old business
 - Budget (Phil) – The proposed budget represents a 17% increase over 2023. It reflects a \$600 increase for recognitions, software, travel reimbursement for President (33% increase), and a significant decrease in postal fees (due to the use of digital means for distribution. Anticipated income ~\$6000. Four voting members are in favor of adopting, but no quorum at the meeting. An email vote before 12/31 will be needed to approve. **Update:** The budget was approved by email vote on 12/19/23.
 - Slate for upcoming Term (Kristin) – no report. Tom will reach out to find what progress may have been made.
- ❖ Next meeting: Annual Meeting @ Philmont during Faith Week. Next Board meeting March 3.

The free downloadable kit includes two images that are sized perfectly for a 36" x 48" tri-fold project board, and a list of links to downloadable documents for display or handouts. Send an image to your vendor of choice for printing on adhesive backed vinyl (costs about \$30) and select and print the documents you wish to hand out (or hand out the list of links). Place the vinyl image on your own display board (~\$10 at your office supply store), and you're ready to go!

NLA Four Star Scholarship

Amount: Two (2) \$500.00 scholarships will be awarded annually by NLAS

Eligibility: Open to all youth registered with American Heritage Girls, Girl Scouts of the USA, or Boy Scouts of America who have successfully earned four (4) P.R.A.Y. Program Awards and are seniors in High School. Scholarships are for post-secondary education and will be paid directly to the designated institution.

Criteria for consideration:

1. P.R.A.Y Awards: Earning the following: 1) either Jesus & Me or God & Me, 2) God & Family, 3) God & Church, and 4) God & Life.

2. Congregational activities: Summary of participation in home congregation such as confirmation education, youth group activities, or church sponsored programs. In addition:

A 500-1000 word faith statement from applicant.

Letter of Recommendation from Pastor of home congregation.

3. Academics: High School transcript reflecting a minimum of six (6) semesters of academic achievement that states unweighted and weighted GPA.

4. Summary of Extra-Curricular activities/awards: Summary of activities (such as athletics, drama, robotics, band, or choir) and awards (such as varsity letter(s), NHS, or John Philip Sousa award).

5. Scouting program: Summary of participation years and highest rank achieved (such as Gold Award, Stars & Stripes Award, Eagle Scout rank).

Qualifying Institutions: Accredited Junior Colleges, Colleges, Universities, or Vocational Schools. Awarded scholarship funds will be paid directly to the institution in the name of the recipient for tuition costs only. Funds cannot be applied to books, room & board, or travel expenses.

Application Process:

Applications may be submitted to NLAS from January 1 to May 1, 2024

Review by NLAS will be completed by May 15, 2024

Recommended recipients will be approved by NLAS Board by June 1, 2024

Recipients will be notified by June 15, 2024

Council-level Duty to God Award.

Shortly after the National Duty to God Award was established in 2016 to recognize transformational leadership in promoting Duty to God at the national level, applications began arriving for Scouters who were doing exceptional work at the council level. The need for a council-level award similar to the National award was recognized.

The BSA National Religious Relationships Committee announced at the Duty to God Breakfast of the National Annual Meeting on 31 May the establishment of a *Council Duty to God Award*. The Council Duty to God Award was created to recognize those registered Scouters who have demonstrated an exemplary history of transformational leadership in supporting and promoting the spiritual foundation of Scouting at the local Council level. The award is ready to kick off for the 2024 year,



with information and nomination application available at the Duty to God BSA web site <http://bit.ly/3LqUtjB>

An unlimited number of nominations can be submitted to any Council each year, but a maximum of


two Council Duty to God Awards per year may be awarded by 100 and 200 level councils and a maximum of one Council Duty to God Award per year may be awarded by 300, 400, and 500 level councils.

The NRRC suggests that the Council Duty to God Award presentation should be conducted with the highest level of honor at a council event (such as the council's Silver Beaver recognition) or a religious emblem ceremony of the recipient's faith. Each recipient should receive recognition worthy of the service rendered on Scouting's behalf.
