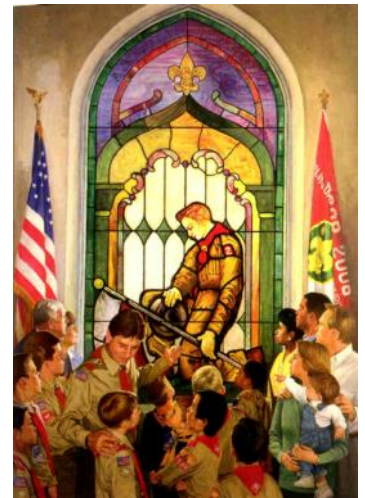

Here's how you can participate in the National Day of Prayer

The National Day of Prayer is May 2, 2024. The BSA's National Religious Relationships Committee is inviting all Scouts and their families to participate by reading a portion of their own sacred text at 5:30 p.m. local time on that day.

"Our world needs the power of prayer and positive action more than ever," says Jim Marchbank, chair of the council support subcommittee of the National Religious Relationships Committee. "We are inviting every Scout to read their sacred texts on this important day. This Duty to God event allows Scouts to broaden their faith and deepen their spirituality with their family in their homes or at their faith institution."

We are very pleased to have the Far East and the Transatlantic councils participate. That means Scouts will start reading at 5:30 p.m. in the Far East, seven hours later, Scouts read in Europe, we cross the Atlantic and six hours later, Scouts begin reading on the East Coast, then Midwest and finish in Hawaii. What a vision to have Sacred Texts being read starting in the Far East and sweeping west all around the world – all on the U.S. National Day of Prayer.

What is the National Day of Prayer?

The National Day of Prayer — held each year on the first Thursday of May — is a day of observance designated by Congress.

How can Scouts participate?

The BSA's National Religious Relationships Committee is encouraging Scouts to read their own sacred text at 5:30 p.m. local time on the National Day of Prayer.



Scouts can:

- Read their text at home with their family;
- Talk to their faith leader about reading at their faith location;
- Ask a Scout friend to join them either at home or at their faith location.

And yes, there will be a patch!

Scout Sunday 2024

Scout Sunday is a great time for units to show appreciation for the support of their Scouting activities received from their charter or hosting congregation. It's also a time for the congregation to thank THEIR units for the service and outreach they represent for the congregation in the surrounding community. Scout Sunday is an appropriate time to recognize youth who have grown in their faith by completing the religious emblems and to recognize adults who have served them and set a godly example of life.

Lamb Award

On March 17th, Redeemer Lutheran in Huntington Beach, California celebrated Scout Sunday as well as the presentation of the Lamb Award to the Pastor, Rev. Tom Miller.



In the early 2000's, Tom began his journey into the pastorate. He started taking classes and was subsequently licensed as a Deacon by the Pacific Southwest District of the LCMS to serve in word and sacrament ministry at St. Paul's Lutheran in Garden Grove, CA.

Moving to Redeemer in 2015, he relinquished his role as a Deacon because the congregation believed that ordination was required for word and sacrament ministry. Tom applied for ordination through colloquy. He was accepted and ordained in December of 2022.

As you can read elsewhere, Tom is finishing his term as President of NLAS and plans to continue to serve as Treasurer and on the BSA's National Religious Relationships Committee

Though chartered by a local service group, Troop 558 meets at the church and has helped them with numerous service projects over the years.

Eagles in Action

Emily Augustine from BSA Troop 800 in Gardner, Kansas recently passed her Board of Review for Eagle Scout.

Emily has a passion for kiddos who are involved in the foster care system. For her Eagle Scout Project, Emily contacted a local social service agency that provides services for those involved in foster care. Emily learned that many foster kids are unable to have a proper birthday celebration due to often moving from one home to another and the families not having the supplies needed for a birthday present. Emily learned that "Birthdays in a Bag" would be a much sought after product to provide to the foster care agency.

Emily partnered with the Lutheran Laymen's League at King of Kings Lutheran Church in Gardner, Kansas. The LLL donated funds to her troop, designating the funds be used in her Eagle Project. A couple from King of Kings, whose adult son is an Eagle

Scout, partnered with Emily and Thrivent Financial Services and obtained an Action Team Grant of \$250 to further assist in funding the project. Emily, with the help of other troop members, was able to build over 100 Birthday Bags. Included in the birthday bags were "Easy Bake" cake mix, frosting in a can, candles, and party favors.

Congratulations to Emily on achieving the rank of Eagle Scout, but more so for helping brighten the lives of young people in the foster care system.

NLAS is cooperating with the BSA's National Religious Relationships Committee to take over the entire Philmont Training Center the week of July 7-13 for a week of training, discussions, fellowship, service and family fun.

Here's an overview of the week:

-  **Monday- Position Breakout Classes:** Choose two positions you want to learn more about. (Example: learn about the resources available for BSA Unit Leaders in the morning and Religious Emblems Coordinators in the afternoon.)
-  **Tuesday- Faith Specific Classes:** You have the opportunity to learn in-depth resources that are specific to an individual faith group in three (3) sessions during the week. There is a whole list to choose from. Some faiths will be repeating the same session three times, others may have a different topic in each of their sessions, and some faiths may only have one session offered.
-  **Wednesday & Friday Morning- Free Choice Classes OR Service Projects OR Field Trips:** The choice is yours during these two half-days. We have a wide variety of University of Scouting classes from which to choose. OR you can participate in a half day field trip or service project.
-  **Wednesday Afternoon- Family Time:** You've got the afternoon off to explore PTC, Philmont's Camping Headquarters, or the surrounding areas of beautiful Northern New Mexico.
-  **Thursday Morning- All Faith Sessions:** We'll all be together for this half day answering the always important question..."I have a Scout in my unit that is ___ faith. What do I need to know to help them with Duty to God?"
-  **Friday Afternoon- Speed Networking:** The topics are your choice throughout the week. We'll hold up signs with a topic name and you choose which one to go to in our 20 -minute lightning networking sessions. PLUS Graduation, goal setting, and celebrating an awesome week.
-  **Kids and spouse programs** are offered each day by the PTC staff. Meals are served in the dining hall so you can eat with your family, faculty and new friends.

Nominees for National Officers of the Executive Board

Every two years a **Nominating Committee** is formed to develop a slate of nominees for the national officers of the Executive Board of the National Lutheran Association on Scouting: President-Elect, Secretary, Treasurer, and two Members at Large. The officers are elected by the voting membership (dues-paid and honorary members) of NLAS and are installed at the annual meeting in even numbered years. Terms are for two years with the exception of President-Elect who succeeds to the office of President after two years.

Members should expect an email with the link for online voting to come out in May.

President-Elect—Ben Wheeler

Ben joins the NLAS Board from his current role as Scout Executive & Chief Executive Officer of the Chester County Council outside Philadelphia. Ben is an Eagle Scout with Gold, Silver and Bronze Palms who earned 125 merit badges. He earned his Lutheran God and Church Youth Religious Emblem Award. Ben is also an active Order of the Arrow member and is Wood Badge trained.

Ben has an outstanding history (five years running) being the #1 membership recruiter in the entire BSA. While as Scout Executive in 2023, he grew his council's year-end membership over 52% in one year in addition his council ranked 2nd in the nation for total percentage of the market share served.

He has also been a significant volunteer for the BSA. Ben held the titles of District Membership Chairman, District Committee Member, Unit Commissioner, Unit Committee Member, Merit Badge Counselor, and Cubmaster for a pack of 104 kids.

He earned his B.A. in Religion from Lake Forest College and his M.A. in Marriage & Family Therapy from Wheaton College.



Secretary —Wayne Stuckey

Wayne Stuckey has been an active Scouter since 1996. He was a founding leader in Pack 719 in 2003, and served as Scoutmaster of Troop 719 for 1998 – 2004. Wayne served as staff on four National Youth Leadership

Training (NYLT) and two Wood Badge courses, and he conducted troop youth leadership training for 2002-2016. He served as Advisor for 37 Eagle Scouts. Wayne strongly advocates the Religious Emblems program. He has been on the board of the NLAS since 2010, serving as NLAS President for 2016-2018 and as Secretary from 2018 to present. He served on NLAS exhibit staff at the BSA National Jamboree in 2010, 2013, and 2017, and the Girl Scouts Phenom P.R.A.Y. exhibit in 2023. He attended the "Scouting in the Lutheran Church" conference at PTC five times, serving on faculty three times. Wayne has served on the BSA National Religious Relationships Committee since 2015. He has been recognized with the Lutheran Lamb and the God & Service Award, and is a 2023 recipient of the BSA National Duty to God Award. He has also received the Silver Beaver, Scoutmaster Award of Merit, District Award of Merit, the James E. West Award and the PTC Master's Track. Wayne is a Vigil Honor member of the Order of the Arrow. He is the father of two Eagle Scouts and a Girl Scout Gold Award recipient.

Tom has been active in BSA since 1968. An Eagle Scout, and Vigil Honor member of the Wiatava Lodge, he is currently a member at Large of the Golden West District Committee, having previously served numerous leadership positions in the Cub Scout, Scouts BSA, and Sea Scout programs. He served as Scoutmaster for the Orange County Council Spring Wood Badge course in 2015. NLA Four Star Scholarship

Amount: Two (2) \$500.00 scholarships will be awarded annually by NLAS

Eligibility: Open to all youth registered with American Heritage Girls, Girl Scouts of the USA, or Boy Scouts of America who have successfully earned four (4) P.R.A.Y. Program Awards and are seniors in High School. Scholarships are for post-secondary education and will be paid directly to the designated institution.

Criteria for consideration:

1. P.R.A.Y Awards: Earning the following: 1) either Jesus & Me or God & Me, 2) God & Family, 3) God & Church, and 4) God & Life.
2. Congregational activities: Summary of participation in home congregation such as confirmation education, youth group activities, or church sponsored programs. In addition:
 - A 500-1000 word faith statement from applicant.
 - Letter of Recommendation from Pastor of home congregation.
3. Academics: High School transcript reflecting a minimum of six (6) semesters of academic achievement that states unweighted and weighted GPA.
4. Summary of Extra-Curricular activities/awards:

Summary of activities (such as athletics, drama, robotics, band, or choir) and awards (such as varsity letter(s), NHS, or John Philip Sousa award).

5. Scouting program: Summary of participation years and highest rank achieved (such as Gold Award, Stars & Stripes Award, Eagle Scout rank).

Qualifying Institutions: Accredited Junior Colleges, Colleges, Universities, or Vocational Schools. Awarded scholarship funds will be paid directly to the institution in the name of the recipient for tuition costs only. Funds cannot be applied to books, room & board, or travel expenses.

Application Process:

Applications may be submitted to NLAS from January 1 to May 1, 2024.

Review by NLAS will be completed by May 15, 2024.

Recommended recipients will be approved by NLAS Board by June 1, 2024.

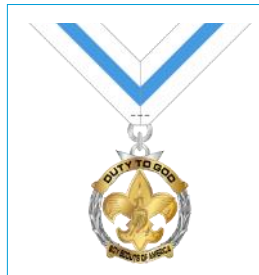
Recipients will be notified by June 15, 2024.



Council-level Duty to God Award.

Shortly after the National Duty to God Award was established in 2016 to recognize transformational leadership in promoting Duty to God at the national level, applications began arriving for Scouters who were doing exceptional work at the council level. The need for a council-level award similar to the National award was recognized.

The BSA National Religious Relationships Committee announced at the Duty to God Breakfast of the National Annual Meeting on 31 May the establishment of a *Council Duty to God Award*. The Council Duty to God Award was created to recognize those registered Scouters who have demonstrated an exemplary history of transformational leadership in supporting and promoting the spiritual foundation of Scouting at the local Council level. The award is ready to kick off for the 2024 year,

An unlimited number of nominations can be submitted to any Council each year, but a maximum of two

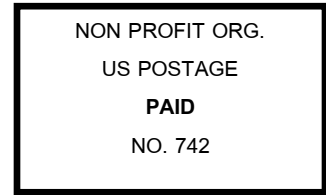
Council Duty to God Awards per year may be awarded by 100 and 200 level councils and a maximum of one Council Duty to God Award per year may be awarded by 300, 400, and 500 level councils.

The NRRC suggests that the Council Duty to God Award presentation should be conducted with the highest level of honor at a council event (such as the council's Silver Beaver recognition) or a religious emblem ceremony of the recipient's faith. Each recipient should receive recognition worthy of the service rendered on Scouting's behalf.
