Religious Emblems Promotion Night

Mark your calendars for Thursday, February 27, 2025, at 7:00 p.m. CST. For Religious Emblems Promotion Night Be sure to spread the word to other leaders, parents and Scouts.

The Promotion Night is a new Zoom event intended to showcase how to start earning a religious emblem. Adult leaders, kids and parents around the country can join to learn how to begin earning the emblem for their faith. There will be an opening session with Jason Noland of P.R.A.Y. who will explain common faith group things for religious emblems such as the national brochure and uniform knots. There will also be door prize drawings.

After the opening session everyone will move into a breakout room by the faith they want to learn about—it need not be their own faith. For example, a Christian Scoutmaster might want to find out how to guide a Jewish Scout to begin earning his/her Nir Tamid. Once the session is over, that concludes the event.

Have you ever invited a fellow Lutheran to join NLAS only to hear this question in response?

I have ... many times. Actually, it's a really common question most people have when asked to join a group; a reflection of today's society interest or focus. I must admit that it took quite a while before I came up with a good way to deal with the question. We just have to redirect the asker to a better question.

To paraphrase a famous quote, "Ask not what the NLAS can do for you; ask what your membership will help the NLAS do for youth." I've found that most would love to provide information on Religious Emblems; help with adult recognitions; provide scholarships, special certificates and other support; recognize units; provide "Duty to God" support to volunteers, districts and councils - - - if only they had the resources to do it.

Membership in the NLAS gives access to those resources, programs and recognitions. When combined with other members', one's annual dues are multiplied and make it possible for the NLAS to support Lutheran congregations, schools and organizations in using the programs of our partner youth-serving agencies . . . the Boy Scouts of America, the Girl Scouts of the USA and The American Heritage Girls.

Lutheran Recognition of Excellence (LRE)



Has your unit earned the Lutheran Recognition of Excellence? The purpose of this award is to recognize outstanding Cub Scout Packs, Scouts BSA Troops, Venturing

Crews, Sea Scout Ships and Explorer Posts that are chartered by Lutheran congregations or other Lutheran organizations and have met the criteria established by the National Lutheran Association on Scouting.

Here are the criteria: Within the calendar year the unit shall have accomplished all of the following:

- 1. Earned the Journey To Excellence Award (Bronze, Silver, or Gold level) of the Boy Scouts of America.
- 2. Ten percent or more of the registered youth members of the unit were enrolled in or have completed the appropriate Religious Emblems Program for their age level and religious affiliation.
- 3. The pastor serves as the Religious Emblems Counselor or has appointed someone to serve

in that capacity for the Jesus and Me, God and Me, God and Family, God and Church and the God and Life (as applicable) Religious Emblems Programs.

- 4. The unit participated in the local Lutheran congregation Scout Sunday observance and completed at least one service project for the chartering Lutheran organization.
- 5. The unit provided regular worship opportunities when away from their home congregations on Sundays for camping trips and outings, and provided the appropriate religious setting for banquets, ceremonies and other unit events (such as, prayer at unit and leader meetings or events).
- 6. The Chartered Organization Representative (COR) shall be a member of the chartering Lutheran congregation or, for other Lutheran organizations, a communicant member of a local Lutheran congregation.
- 7. For Scouts BSA Troops only*, the Chaplain Aide(s) is/are trained and actively working with a Lutheran pastor, youth minister, or designated lay person.




Build-it-Yourself Religious Emblems Tabletop Display Kits

Have you ever wanted to explain the Religious Emblems at an event, or talk about your Lutheran faith to youth? Is making a nice Religious Emblems display too hard? NLAS is pleased to present two build-it-yourself tabletop displays. The free downloadable kit includes two images that are sized perfectly for a 36" x 48" tri-fold project board, and a list of links to downloadable documents for display or handouts. A third display is also available that explains Scouting as a Congregational Ministry.

Download one of the displays and send the image to your vendor of choice for printing on adhesive backed vinyl (costs about \$30). Place the vinyl image on your own display board (\sim \$10 at your office supply store), and you're ready to go! You can also select and print the documents you wish to hand out (or hand out the list of links).

NLAS Four Star Scholarship

Amount: Two (2) \$500.00 scholarships will be awarded annually by NLAS.

Eligibility: Open to all youth registered with American Heritage Girls, Girl Scouts of the USA, or Scouting America who have successfully earned four (4) P.R.A.Y. Program Awards and are seniors in high school. Scholarships are for post-secondary education and will be paid directly to the designated institution.

Criteria for consideration:

- 1. P.R.A.Y Awards: Earning the following: 1) either Jesus & Me or God & Me, 2) God & Family, 3) God & Church, and 4) God & Life.
- 2. Congregational activities: Summary of participation in home congregation such as confirmation education, youth group activities, or church sponsored programs. In addition:
 - A 500-1000 word faith statement from applicant.
 - Letter of Recommendation from Pastor of home congregation.
- 3. Academics: High School transcript reflecting a minimum of six (6) semesters of academic achievement that states unweighted and weighted GPA.

- 4. Summary of Extra-Curricular activities/ awards: Summary of activities (such as athletics, drama, robotics, band, or choir) and awards (such as varsity letter(s), NHS, or John Philip Sousa award).
- 5. Scouting program: Summary of participation years and highest rank achieved (such as Gold Award, Stars & Stripes Award, Eagle Scout rank).

Qualifying Institutions: Accredited Junior Colleges, Colleges, Universities, or Vocational Schools. Awarded scholarship funds will be paid directly to the institution in the name of the recipient for tuition costs only. Funds cannot be applied to books, room & board, or travel expenses.

Application Process:

Applications may be submitted to NLAS from January 1 to May 1, 2025.

Review by NLAS will be completed by May 15, 2025.

Recommended recipients will be approved by NLAS Board by June 1, 2025.

Recipients will be notified by June 15, 2025.



Council-level Duty to God Award.

Similar to the National *Duty to God Award*, the Council *Duty to God Award* was created by the

BSA National Religious Relationships Committee to recognize those registered Scouters who have demonstrated an exemplary history of transformational leadership in supporting and promoting the spiritual foundation of Scouting at the local Council level. Information and nomination applica-

tions are available at the Duty to God BSA web site http://bit.ly/3LqUtjB

An unlimited number of nominations can be submitted to any Council each year, but a maxi-

mum of two Council Duty to God Awards per year may be awarded by 100 and 200 level

councils and a maximum of one Council Duty to God Award per year may be awarded by 300, 400, and 500 level councils.

The NRRC suggests that the Council *Duty* to God Award presentation should be conducted with the highest level of honor at a council event (such as the coun-

cil's Silver Beaver recognition) or a religious emblem ceremony of the recipient's faith. Each recipient should receive recognition worthy of the service rendered on Scouting's behalf.
